Tena Koutou te whanau o Te Kura o Ruawai Greetings to the families of Ruawai College



The school feels very settled and the staff are focused strongly on "presence and engagement". Our expectations are that students be at school and on time. We know that a student's attendance has a direct impact on their learning and research has found that there is a clear

link: Students who come to class and arrive on time do better in school. Regular attendance is important because:

- The student is more likely to develop responsibility, self-discipline and effective work skills
- The habits that are set in place now will carry over into the workplace later
- The student is more likely to stay out of trouble
- · Missing too much school is often the first step toward dropping out
- The student will be more likely to have success in NCEA

A prerequisite to success in any endeavour is "showing up", and classes are no exception. If you're not showing up to class, you're forfeiting every opportunity provided to you in the classroom.

As a parent/caregiver what can you do to help?

Your commitment to school attendance will send a message to your child that education is a priority for your family, going to school every day is a critical part of educational success.

- Expect them to attend every day, don't accept excuses unless they are too sick to come to school
- Avoid scheduling family trips or doctor/other visits during school time
- Make sure your child stays healthy by getting enough rest, exercise and eating well
- Get to know the LA and Dean early on they are there to help, listen and talk to if an issue arises

Attendance at school is compulsory until the age of 16. Anything less than 90% puts a student's chance of academic success at risk. Even 90% attendance means that a student is missing a full day of school fortnightly, over a term it equates to a full week and across the year it adds up to a month. The minimum target the school sets for attendance is 95% - the goal is 100%. We recognise and acknowledge those students with excellent attendance especially through our assemblies. When strong attendance is combined with determination and hard work, the core ingrediants of a successful education are complete.

PB4L Restorative Practice - ToD, Friday 7th April

A Teacher Only Day will be held around PB4L Restorative Practice. It is based on a set of best practice tools and techniques to support a consistent and sustainable approach to managing positive, respectful relationships within the school. Feedback from schools involved in using this practice show -

- a calmer school environment, with less classroom disruption and more time for teaching
- an increase in the engagement and learning of students in the classroom
- growth in relational and problem-solving skills, both for adults and students across the school community
- improvements in attitudes and relationships across the whole school community

Year 7 - 10 Mathematics Homework Programme

This year as part of their Mathematics programme, all Year 7 – 10 students will be given a "Maths Mate" worksheet each week. The Maths Mate Programme is based on the principle that regular, structured practice helps in the development of both short and long term memory. As a result, students' mathematical knowledge, skills and problem solving abilities are consolidated and extended through systematic, weekly revision.

The Maths Mate worksheets have been designed to allow students to attempt all questions without the aid of a calculator and this should be encouraged at home.

Don't be too concerned if your child finds the initial worksheets difficult. It is not expected that students will be able to complete every question; in fact question 32 has been included to offer a real challenge to all students. Each worksheet is built around a common framework of

questions aimed at covering the New Zealand Mathematics Curriculum. Students will attempt the same type of question on a regular basis, The diagnostic nature of the worksheets will help students and teachers to identify areas of strength and weakness. This should also help to motivate students to make another attempt at mastering skills that they may have found too difficult in the past.

If your child is having difficulty with a certain skill, Skill Builders are available to students from the Maths Mates website www.mathsmate.co.nz. The Skill Builders also contain a Glossary of important facts and reference material that will provide students with instant help.

All classroom teachers have a set homework day for homework marking and the collection of the next sheet. If a student is absent from class that day, then it is the student's responsibility to liaise with the classroom teacher.

Uniform

Wearing a school uniform has many of the following benefits:

- Improved School Image
 - School uniform buries the daily question of "what to wear to school". It removes a potentially major point of debate between parent and child over the suitability of what gets worn to school. It should be hassle free.
- Higher Self Esteem
 - Students wearing school uniform do not feel self conscious about what they wear to school; increased confidence leaders to higher self esteem, and higher self esteem leads to greater class participation.
- Higher Standard of Presentation
 - A uniform becomes a better way for school staff to implement a dress code within a school, especially in how it is worn and thus presented to the external community.
 - Trying to instigate a dress standard where no school uniform exists is an exercise in comparative futility.
- Cost Effective
 - There is no doubt that a quality, value for money school uniform has a lower cost to parents than if their children wore their 'street clothes' to school on a consistent basis.
 - School uniforms should be designed to take the rigour of daily wear and exercise, and they should out perform standard garments.
- Better School Security
 - Students in uniform are instantly recognised as 'belonging' to their school.
 - This assists security in school, and enables easy identification off-site.

We appreciate the effort that you as whānau make to ensure that your children come to school in the correct school uniform.

Students Bringing a Vehicle to School

Students may drive to school and park in the gym carpark, permitted they have either a Restricted or Full licence.

Before bringing a car to school, students must provide a copy of their licence and complete a permission slip signed by their parent/caregiver. It is up to the discretion of our Senior Leadership Team whether or not students have permission to have a car at school.

Students are required to hand their keys in to the office on arrival and must travel alone unless they are permitted to carry passengers. Under no circumstances are students allowed to drive other students to and from school.
