



African Drumming



CAITLIN'S PEANUT BUTTER COOKIES

You will need:

150g soft butter
150g smooth peanut
butter
1 teaspoon of vanilla
essence
225g soft brown sugar
2 free range eggs
200g plain flour
1 teaspoon baking
powder
½ teaspoon salt
OPTIONAL:
100g chopped raw

Equipment

chips

A large mixing bowl A wooden spoon A fork A sieve A large non-stick or greased baking sheet Oven gloves A wire cooling rack

peanuts or chocolate



Preheat the oven to 180' Celsius

Put butter, peanut butter, vanilla essence and sugar into the mixing bowl and beat together. Next, beat the eggs with a fork and then beat them into the mixture.

Sift the flour, baking powder and salt into peanut butter mixture. Combine until the mixture is smooth. Stir through peanuts or chocolate chips (optional).

Drop teaspoons of the mixture onto the baking sheet. You don't have to spread them. Bake them for 10 minutes if you like them chewy, or for 15 minutes if you like them crispy.

Let cookies cool on the baking sheet for 5 minutes and then move them to a wire rack to cool completely.


The Year 7's Voice at Ruawai College

Blake Hassall went to YELF 2018

The annual Youth Enviro Leaders' Forum from April 14-20, 2018, was held in Taranaki. I was very fortunate to be one of 55 young environmental leaders from all over New Zealand to come together for a week of adventure-based learning, to look at several topical environmental issues facing our country and to develop strategies to address them.

The first day was a bit nerve racking but it was also exciting at the same time, meeting 54 random people. Yet we all had similar interests which allowed all of the students to link easily and make friends. We spent the first couple of days getting to know one another and developing our leadership roles at TOPEC - The Taranaki Outdoor Pursuit Centre.



On Monday, we sat down and started to learn about the environment. First on the agenda was a trip down to the one of the local farms to talk about agricultural innovation. The main point of this was to learn about a new vaccine scientists are trying to make to reduce the amount of methane cows produce.

The day after involved a trip down to Methanex to learn about a cleaner fuel source.

The next day was a trip to the harbour to collect samples of plankton and then to study them at the local science lab. That same day we also learned that even the slightest increase of ocean acidification can affect the ecosystem drastically.

The last day was full of activities consisting of writing and presenting a minute-long speech in front of 60 people, one of them being to the deputy mayor of Taranaki. I learned a lot more about environmental issues facing our community and country and have come back even more inspired to do something about it. We had a number of informative speakers which included people from the Ministry for the Environment, Sir Peter Blake Trust alumni, local politicians and community leaders.

At Ruawai College we have started up an ECO Warriors group and our aim is to inform the school and the community about environmental issues and how we can address them. One of the immediate things that we will be doing is increasing the recycling around the school.

Harriet has a taste of the New Zealand Airforce

In the holidays, I spent 8 days at the New Zealand Air Force base in Ohakea for a School to Skies course. This course is a tech and aviation camp that provides girls in Year 13 with a chance to experience different careers in the forces. I met many new people and spent the week with 47 like-minded girls in year 13 from all over the country interested in science, aviation, tech and engineering. The Air Force is made up of 17% women and is wanting to be 25% by 2025. New Zealand needs more women in STEM careers and this course was extremely helpful even if we choose not to join the Airforce.

The week offered plenty of hands-on mechanical and electrical learning which involved helping dismantle and repair an old training helicopter. Over the week I also got to visit safety and surface, machining/welding/skin, avionics and force protection, where we did a navigation exercise in which we rescued an injured pilot from an enemy base with the use of smoke grenades and camouflage paint. We also took part in several PT sessions and planned a rescue mission. A highlight for me was definitely flying in an NH90 helicopter after planning a rescue mission, especially when the doors were open and we flew over the beach, as well as flying the NH90 in the simulator.

We had many talks and lectures throughout the week, on subjects including the basic principles of flight, our flight commanders own personal experiences in the air force, an air force psychologist, an entertaining talk about her career by Michelle Dickinson, also known as Nanogirl, and an inspiring talk from Alexia Hilbertidou, the young founder of Girl Boss.



The busy week ended with an ANZAC parade at dawn in the nearby town of Bulls.

I had a great experience and it showed me possibilities for my future that I hadn't considered before.

I really recommend this course and encourage you to take every opportunity that arises. Don't be afraid to follow a passion that those around you may not share. Do what you love and just give it a try even, or especially if you don't yet know what your passion is.

At our recent meeting, we were presented with some very informative reports on our confirmed NCEA results for 2017 which stimulated much discussion. We were very pleased with the results and congratulate the students on their achievements and acknowledge the tremendous effort that the staff make to enable our students to succeed. Looking at our results in comparison to our neighbouring schools, Ruawai College can be very proud at all levels of NCEA. Part of our discussion was around the barriers to success.
