Hello staff, students and the Ruawai College community. It's time for me to say my farewells to you though I have no doubt I shall see you all when I come relief teaching or around the village. I want to share with you my parting thoughts of our school.

Ruawai is a great place and this is a great school. Enjoy it while you are here. Some of you criticize it because you are so familiar with it, that you forget to appreciate what you have - and I do speak from experience.

Places... I was born and raised in Te Atatu North, a suburb of Auckland, but really just another village connected to other villages by houses. After leaving home I lived in Massey, Henderson, Mt Albert, Mt Eden, Ponsonby, Herne Bay, Mangere Bridge and Balmoral.

I've lived in Huntly, Dargaville and Ruawai and travelled New Zealand, sometimes just visiting family and friends, sometimes just to experience a new place.

I've travelled outside New Zealand, twice on cruise ships to the islands, across the USA by train for 6 weeks on my own, in a Contiki bus around Europe for 8 weeks, in a car around Britain for 4 weeks with strangers and 7 months nannying and travelling around England. I have shifted house over 35 times and travelled to many other places for short periods of time. In all those places I've lived and travelled I have met good people and had a group of friends.

For Health education with the New Zealand Curriculum it is expected that schools will consult with their communities when developing health and sexuality education programmes at least once every two years.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank those parents and community members who completed the online survey about the Health Programmes we currently teach at Ruawai College. to our programme can accommodate the suggestions made. The New Zealand Curriculum states that the focus of health is on the wellbeing of the students themselves, of other people, and of society through learning in health-related contexts. Four concepts are at the heart of this learning area:

- Hauora / Wellbeing
- Attitudes and Values
- Socio-ecological Perspective
- Health Promotion

Within Health and Physical Education, we are also expected to cover the seven key areas of learning. These are mental health, sexuality education, food and nutrition, body care and physical safety, physical activity, sport studies and outdoor education. This year the health topics to be taught alongside the Physical

Education curriculum in school include:

#### Year 7 – Term 3

Anger: Learning different ways of dealing with anger and approaching conflict and feelings in a constructive way. Coping skills and how to deal with issues in a positive way.

#### Year 8 – Term 3

My Body & Puberty: Identifying different aspects that affect males and females during puberty and who may help us cope with these changes. Gaining a better understanding of the parts of the body.

#### Year 9 – Term 3

Bullying: Identifying types of bullying, characteristics of a bully, asking for help, dealing with bullying as a bystander and strategies to manage bullying.

#### Year 10 – Term 3

Whanaungatanga / Friendship: Exploring friendship and how to achieve positive outcomes. Building trust with interpersonal relationships. The importance of having a positive wellbeing and where to go for support if needed.

# CURRICULUM

#### Level 2 Geography Tongariro Trip

On Monday 22 June, the Year 12 Geography class went to the Tongariro Volcanic Centre for 3 nights to conduct field research on the types of

vegetation that grows on the western and eastern side of Mt Ruapehu, documenting how the climate and volcanic activity affects plant growth.

As a class we were lucky to have great weather so we weren't too cold and could see the mountains clearly.

Our first site on the western side had large Beech trees and a lot of vegetation growth. At our second site on the eastern side, there were only small shrubs and dry soil. You can see the comparison of the two sites below.





As a class we completed the first part of the world renowned hike, the Tongariro Crossing. We enjoyed the hike itself and views of the volcanic environment.

We had a relaxing swim at the Tokaanu Thermal Pools and a great stay at the Piper's Lodge accommodation where we ate good, hearty meals where there was plenty to eat (Mikaere ate 6 pieces of fish!)

"We noticed that there were no trees on the eastern side due to the volcanic eruptions. The prevailing westerly winds carry the ash to the east, covering the land where only hardy plants can survive like tussocks and moss.

It also receives high wind, not much rainfall therefore the soil was hard and dry.

The trip overall was a cool time with my classmates."

"We saw when we drove through the desert road all the different layers of ash from when the volcanoes erupted. At one site we saw the ash from around 9 eruptions from the past."

### WHAT'S HAPPENING @ RUAWAI COLLEGE

#### **School Korowai**

During lockdown, like many whanau I was struggling to detach from technology and finding something to do with the limited resources I had at home. I decided to create a korowai (cloak) for the school to show the appreciation that I had for the staff and whanau that have made my time at the kura so enjoyable.

Tāniko is a uniquely Maori variation of whatu (twining) and was used to weave the colourful, intricate borders of the cloaks. In cloak making, tāniko was used only for borders since the weave is too stiff to suit entire garments. Tāniko is also used to make pari (bodices), tipare (head bands), tapeka (sashes), tātua (belts) and taonga whakapaipai (jewellery). I started the korowai with tāniko designs that usually expresses histories, ideas and values important to Te Ao Maori (The Maori World). Using the pattern aronui which are triangular, the design refers to the pursuit of knowledge about the natural world, which I thought was fitting for a kura korowai.



The lower half has a range of feathers gathered from many different birds. I was fortunate enough to have received a gift of feathers from Yvette Morfett and her duck hunting whanau. These were used along with feathers from my mother's chickens. When we moved to Level 3 I was able to buy feathers online which made the process a little easier as the traditional form of weaving feathers can take up to 200 man hours for a short korowai. These were purchased readymade and already dyed so I was able to incorporate the school colours in both the tāniko and feathers.

The korowai was blessed, then gifted to the kura on our return to school in Level 2. This is a thank you to the Board of Trustees, staff, tamariki and Senior Leadership Team of Ruawai College, of whom all are represented in this korowai. Those that wear the korowai will have the warmth of those mentioned wrapped around them.
