



Year 12 / 13 Bay of Islands Trip

On Wednesday 26 of February the Year 12 and 13 History students travelled to the Bay of Islands to visit various historical sites

related to our assessment, such as the Pompallier Mission House, Kemp House, Stone Store, the Christ Church and the and the Flagstaff above Kororāreka (Russell).

The purpose of our trip was to study the history and background of each site and examine evidence that we could use as primary sources, specifically during the time period of the 19th century.

Overall, it was a fun and exciting day as we not only got to learn about the raw and controversial history of early New Zealand and the 'ripple effect' it had on today's society, but to also experience the Bay of Islands first hand and gather the research.

Year 12 and 13 History students would highly recommend this trip to any younger students if given the opportunity. Learning about New Zealand and it's colonial history gives you a sense of what New Zealand was like in those times.

Curriculum Focus – English

WHY READ?

The reasons reading is vitally important.

Often we hear students say that they can read already, that they know how to read, so what's the point of reading in English classes?

We can say that we gain knowledge from books, that it increases our imagination and creativity, that it increases our vocabulary, that reading relaxes us, reduces tension and helps our sleep patterns, that it improves our memory, that we learn to concentrate for a longer period of time, that it can improve our mood, and that it can expose us to new ways of thinking and broaden our minds.

And all these are very true.

However, I believe that the most important reason we read is that it is an efficient way to exercise our brains. Our brain is similar to a muscle in that the more we use it the stronger and more capable it becomes. Concentrating on the words and on a storyline or making sense of information gives our brains a task that stimulates and develops it. Like a muscle, the more we use our brain the more it is capable of. It goes beyond decoding and sounding out words on a page; we are able to read more and more complex sentences and vocabulary, to being able to think in more abstract and complex ways.

Exercising your brain continues all our lives and we become more capable thinkers.

However, just like a muscle, the brain can become less capable and less efficient if we rest it for too long. We need to read frequently and for a sustained period of time.

At primary school the focus is on students learning to read; at secondary school the focus is on students reading to learn.


The New Zealand Curriculum gives us a goal for students who complete Year 13 English (Level 8). "Students will integrate sources of information, processes, and strategies purposefully, confidently, and precisely to identify, form, and express increasingly sophisticated ideas."

We want them to be able to not only read for enjoyment, but also to be able to comprehend and make use of and think critically about complex texts. Our world is increasingly complex and one of the most valuable ways we can help our children and ourselves is to read.

Read, read, read.


