

Maths Curriculum

"I have missed more than 9,000 shots in my career. I've lost almost 300 games. 26 times I have been trusted to take the game winning shot ... and missed. I have failed over and over and over again in my life. That is why I succeed." (Michael Jordan).

Making mistakes is a natural part of all learning. The latest research for mathematics shows that mistakes are a very important part of learning it. When a person makes an error in maths and they have an opportunity to learn from it, they actually develop a much stronger understanding. In fact, the research states that students learn more from making mistakes than from getting the right answers.

The Mathematics Department is using a problem solving approach to learning. Twice a week, our Year 7-10 students are given tasks similar to 'Fencing the Wetlands' (shown below) to solve in groups.

The big idea for 'Fencing the Wetlands' is finding the perimeter of a composite shape (any shape that is made up of two or more shapes) in a familiar context. Also woven into this problem is multiplication, addition, decimals, rounding, reading for content and vocabulary.

This was the first of our 'measurement problems'. The later measurement problems have included area, surface area, volume, conversion of metric units, using measurement tools and number operations.


Problems are written by our Ruawai teachers and are open-ended. For example: a further step could be: "Is this shape the best option or is there another shape that would be cheaper for Farmer John to fence?" Every student can find a place to start in solving the problem and there are always opportunities to extend students.

There is often more than one way to solve a problem, so students are not told 'how to', but create their own strategies and then check if their answer 'makes sense'. Ultimately, this means the learner formulates their own approaches to solving mathematical problems and that it is more likely to 'stick' rather than the teacher telling them how to do it and students trying to replicate.



There was a range of unique learning experiences that students were involved in, from walking out into an untouched natural wetland to see, hear and experience first-hand the serene peacefulness of the natural environment in the state that it should be. Students were also able to learn about trapping pests, primarily setting traps, removing pests from the traps and the purpose of trapping in native bush.

While on this trip students walked through the "loop walk" and were fortunate enough to get up close and personal with young healthy Kauri Trees, native bird species like the Piwakawaka and Tui.

Finally our students finished the experience by learning how to cut and paint invasive weed species. This supports our native seedlings to grow and flourish. It was a wonderful day, with loads of localised learning.


