As a country, we celebrated Matariki for the first time this year as a public holiday. Ruawai College students created Matariki posters working together with their fellow learning advisory peers, symbolising renewal, creating opportunities, and allowing them to reflect. Our Middle and Junior students worked alongside Ruawai Primary School and Ruawai Kindergarten, supporting their tree planting initiative for Matariki.

This term we began to see some normality post COVID-19, and it was great to have whānau attending in school events such as our Term 1 Celebration Assembly, Cross Country and Senior Parent-Student-Teacher interviews.

For parents of Senior students especially, you may be aware that NCEA is changing, and the first phase of the change is going to be implemented in 2024. To gain NCEA Level 1 qualifications, students will be required to pass externally assessed online tests for literacy and numeracy. Basic literacy reading and writing have a very big part to play in every subject, as well as our day to day life, so I strongly encourage whānau to continue to create a reading culture at home. If you need any help in deciding the right reading books for your child please talk to your child's English teacher.

We have made good progress in rolling out our new revised curriculum delivery this year, witnessing positive shifts among our rangitahi. 
At the school we are actively encouraging our students to make reading an important part of their everyday lives.

- Oversee the management of staff, property, finances, curriculum and administration.


If you feel that being a Parent Board Member is a role you would like to take on, then please keep an eye out for the call for nominations in mid July 2022.

Ruawai College will be using School Docs for all policies and procedures. School Docs manages all documents online, in a way that allows us to maintain, review and update them regularly.

School Docs ensures that all documentation is up to date, that we are following the Ministry of Education's best practice guidelines, and that the school is meeting the reporting requirements.

Belonging to School Docs means:

- Our policies and procedures are online and accessible to the whole school community.
- The content is monitored and updated to comply with New Zealand legislation, ERO requirements and other audits, and in response to advice sent to schools.
- The School Docs review process streamlines reviewing and the advisory service helps to keep Ruawai College compliant.
- Printed copies of policies and procedures are available on request. The website is designed and written for online use; there are links to other pages and to online resources that won't work in a printed version. These links are essential in showing how the policies and procedures relate to each other.
