CURRICULUM This year in social sciences, students have learnt about our environments; social, cultural, natural, and how these environments interact to create changes and impacts. We have been out in the school **SOCIAL SCIENCES** garden, out in the community and had guest speakers in at the school to contribute to our involvement as sustainable citizens. Our exploration of sustainability has also included studies that consider social

and cultural sustainability. We have looked at the impacts of colonisation, the online societies that have impacted our place in the world and the way we engage as both local and global citizens. Some of our modules have had a strong environmental focus to consider our role as stewards of the earth and how we impact the environment.

In one module, we considered environment protection, pest control, conservation of indigenous plants and animals and climate change. In another module, we looked at this relationship from another lens, considering how the earth impacts people, especially in times of natural disaster. Extreme natural events: volcanoes, floods, tsunami, earthquakes, typhoons, hurricanes and cyclones have all impacted or devastated communities and lives. We explored examples and discussed how the reaction of local and global people and organisations in times of crisis can restore these communities.

Other modules took an anthropological approach, considering the ways that the choices of people in positions of power have impacted families, cultures and communities. We considered the ethical responsibilities of those in positions of power and the acts that can be taken to strengthen cultural sustainability both here in Aotearoa and abroad.

Although social science has focused on local histories and environments, we have applied these learnings to consider our place as global citizens. We also considered that we can live and engage in multiple communities at a given time thanks to the developments with the internet, technology and social media. We discussed how we can safely navigate our overlapping societies, and be critical online citizens. We expanded on our learning as active citizens throughout this year, facilitating school community events such as carnival day and the Matariki festival. The event planning and management involved careful consideration, combining our understanding of environmental, organisational, and social demands.

AGRICULTURE LEVEL 1 TRIP

Our Year 11 AG Hort class took part in the PPC skills course which was facilitated by NRC in Whangarei. The students learned first hand the expert skills and knowledge required to control the pests here in Northland but also, more specifically, in the Kaipara region. The skills learnt included how to dispatch live pests, possum fur plucking, skinning and setting up traps. They also gained specific knowledge of different pests in NZ and Northland, and how to set up traps to target these pest species.

Students also learned about the different types of traps that are available and the type of pest each trap is specifically designed for. Overall it was a great trip, the students enjoyed it and learned a lot from it and they will use this knowledge to practice trapping and dispatching pests, especially possums, to support the vision of a pest free Northland or so they can start their own business if they want to.



NCEA Examinations

Term 3 for our senior students is often the culmination of fine tuning the acquisition of their credits and task completion of assessments. The term has been hectic and while many of our students are looking forward to the break, I wish to acknowledge those staff who will be back at school to assist senior students with their work around NCEA credits or extra assistance with preparations for their external examinations. This reflects their commitment to the achievement and success of our students.

This year's NCEA exams start on **Monday 7 November** and will finish on **Friday 2 December**. Morning exams start at 9:30 am and afternoon exams at 2:00 pm. Students should arrive 30 minutes before their exam. Students who arrive more than 30 minutes after the start of the exam will not be able to sit their exam. Students must wear their proper school uniform.

All senior students, except those who are not doing external exams, will be given their Admission Slip. This sets out the date and time of their exams. This is not a copy. It must be bought for every exam. They will not be allowed to sit their exams without it. If they lose their slip they must see Ms Dallison well before the exam. On the reverse of the admission slip is more information about the exams and exam rules.

Preparation for NCEA requires being aware of the examination timetable, establishing a quiet study space with no distractions, getting regular sleep, eating healthy and nutritious food and making use of the lunchtime/after school tutorials that teachers offer.

MATHS WEEK/ MATHEX

One of the best weeks of the year, in my opinion, is Maths Week. Students encounter mathematics in a fun way with this year's spotlight being on basic facts.

Our LA competitions were Connect 4 based on addition, and Bingo with the game boards having the answers to multiplication questions. WRITERS FEST AUCKLAND

On Thursday the 25th of August a group of students attended the Auckland Writers Festival. This was an eye-opening day of lectures from top New Zealand and international writers. First we listened to Femi Faduga– a british young adult sci-fi author– talk about world-building and how physics informed his debut book, *The Upper World*. His unique perspective on how real world physics equations led him to write a story about fantastical time travel taught us that inspiration can come from anywhere.



Anne Kays graced the stage next, discussing her book In Our Own Backyard. This session was very informative on the history of the springbok tour and the effect it had on families and relationships in New Zealand. It was interesting to hear how she blended the non-fiction events with the fictional characters in her book. After lunch, we witnessed an exciting debate between two poets and a playwright on the best form of poetry. This was by far the funniest section, with Victor Rodgers and Amy Mcdaid sharing hilarious free verse and dialogue poems. I would recommend any students check out their work as it is heartfelt and relatable. The audience decided Dialogue poem was the winning form, though I retain a soft spot for a sonnet.

The final session we attended was with award winning poet and Journalist Mohamed Hassan. For all of us this was our first time seeing slam poetry performed. His poems were insightful and poignant. Discussing identity and the bias against muslims in the media, Hassan's talk was the highlight of the day for me. Overall I hope this festival has inspired more Ruawai College students to take up a pen and write a poem or story, after all– as we learnt– if you don't tell your story, someone else will.

BUS SAFETY

Bus safety - 3:00pm - 3:15pm. In response to the rising volume of traffic, both vehicles and humans, the college has actioned procedures in how bus students and pedestrians manage themselves at this time of the day.

At 3:00pm, our first 3 buses line up outside the school in the same order each day and students who travel on these busses: Dargaville, Parahi, Okahu, Te Kowhai make their way directly to their bus. Students who are on the Matakohe, Dargaville and Toka Toka buses wait in a designated area outside H-Block, with the Bus Duty Teacher.

Any student who needs to cross over the state highway to the parking and pick up area must also wait in the designated area. Once the last 3 buses have parked safely the Bus Duty Teacher brings the remaining students to the bus bay. Bus students make their way to their respective bus, and all the other students are crossed safely by the Bus Duty Teacher.

If parents are picking their child up after school, please be aware that there is a wait time of about 5 - 7 minutes before students are crossed over the road to the parking area. We respectfully request that any adults at the college at this time also wait and cross with the students, as this reduces the amount of foot traffic crossing the road and allows a better flow of vehicle traffic.

The first meeting for the new Board was held on Tuesday 27th September 2022. At the first meeting, I was fortunate enough to be elected Board Chairperson and Jo Forsyth Vice Chairperson. These positions are voted in by the full Board, with Parent Representatives required to fill both roles.

Board Comment

While it was "democratically healthy" that there was an election for the Parent Representative positions on the Ruawai College Board, it was still extremely disappointing that only a little over 27% of the eligible parent voters actually voted.

In all communities, particularly small rural ones like Ruawai and surrounds, it is their local education facilities that form the heart of the community. To have Ruawai Kindergarten, Ruawai Primary School and Ruawai College close together forming our very own "educational hub", is outstanding and a real asset to the area. In the 26 years I have been living back in Ruawai, it has been fantastic to watch so many of the community's children progress through their Kindergarten and Primary School years, then finish off with their secondary education at Ruawai College.

With Ruawai College at the heart of our community, it relies heavily on the community's support for its very existence. Ruawai College can offer many courses, and although small in size, can measure up to larger schools in the area and afar. The smaller whanau size is beneficial in many ways, such as the curriculum offered. Ruawai College has spent time looking at ways that the curriculum can be changed to suit our learners better and motivate them to want to achieve the best results possible.

- > The junior school has a cross-curricula focus taught through a homeroom environment and the teachers go to the students. The topics include enviro schools and sustainability in the Kaipara area and passion projects.
- > The middle school group can design their own individual personalized modules, which change every term. These modules consist of the three core subjects of Literacy, Numeracy, and Science, along with a range of other subjects. The students have compulsory requirements to ensure they get the best learning outcomes, but they choose what term these happen.
- > The senior cohort has individual learning packages to provide them with the options they need to follow their selected pathway.

We trust that everyone has some valuable time with whanau and friends over the 3rd term break!
