
We look forward to reuniting with our students in the new year and continuing their learning journey at Ruawai College.

JUNIOR EXAMS

In Term 4, Year 7 to Year 10 students have completed Literacy and Numeracy assessments under exam conditions. The literacy tests included an e-aSTTle digital reading assessment and a Writing e-aSTTle test.

For Numeracy, the Head of Learning Mathematics & Statistics had designed an online assessment. These assessments provide accurate data on the achievement and progress of students in relation to reading, writing, and numeracy. The assessment data provides useful information to establish students' current independent capability, their strengths and areas to focus on.

It further helped specifically to see if a student is working on Advanced/Proficient/Basic curriculum levels for Literacy and Numeracy with respect to the New Zealand Curriculum. These assessments were well received by students as this also helped them to learn about the expectations during NCEA examinations.





YEAR 9 RAINBOWS END TRIP




RUAWAI PRIMARY SCHOOL CALF CLUB






YEAR 10 NCEA SCIENCE

PASSPORT TO THE PACIFIC UMU

On Thursday 8 December 2022 as part of Activities Week, an umu was cooked for the entire school. A Samoan umu is an above-ground oven of hot volcanic stones. The stones are heated in a fire before the food is placed on top, wrapped in banana leaves or coconut fronds, or put into half coconuts. More banana leaves cover the top to seal the 'oven'. Food cooked in an umu includes fish and other seafood, along with pork, chicken, lamb, taro, bananas, and other vegetables. Coconut cream is traditionally used instead of oil.

This activity was related to a module of work that some of our Year 9 & 10 students had chosen to do, called "Passport to the Pacific". Our students helped plan this kaupapa, sorted the food, prepared it, and cooked it. The result was a beautiful, scrumptious meal that was thoroughly enjoyed by all staff and students.

CULTURAL POU UNVEILING

You will notice that a pou now stands at the front of the College entrance - the unveiling took place on Wednesday 30 November. The top of the pou depicts Hineteiwaiwa, the Māori goddess of motherhood, symbolising the nurturing of tamariki/students and encouraging them to follow their dreams. Hineteiwaiwa is wearing a heru (ornamental comb) in her hair which is the symbol of Ngāti Whātua, the local tribe of our area. She also represents mana wahine, symbolising the strong female Ruawai College staff members who are loyal to the growth of secondary education in the Ruawai township.

The middle of the pou shows a rauru (spiral) which represents the Wairoa River in brown and the Kaipara Harbour in blue. Where these bodies of water meet is where the town of Ruawai is located.

Below the rauru is a male face which portrays Tāne-nui-a-Rangi, the god who travelled to the heavens to retrieve three baskets of knowledge and bring them back to the people on earth: te kete-tuatea (basket of light), te kete-tuauri (basket of darkness) and te kete-arouni (basket of pursuit). He represents striving for success and knowledge.

This pou is dedicated to Mrs Linda Sheehan, an educator who taught at Ruawai College for around 39 years, who sadly passed away in December 2021. We thank staff member Keanu Townsend and our students who worked on this taonga for the College


