# PRINCIPAL'S KORERO

One of the key values at Ruawai College is Responsibility - Personal and collective.

Schools are places of learning- academically, socially and emotionally. We speak regularly with our students about taking personal responsibility for their learning and staff work very hard to facilitate this learning.

Sometimes however, there can be a mindset that abdicates this responsibility and therefore learning grinds to a halt. Blaming the coach for not making the team, a team mate for a poor performance, or the teacher for not getting the grades one expected does not expedite positive learning, it actually creates a formidable barrier.

Schools are not just a place in which we learn about academia. It is a place in which we learn critical life skills. It is a place in which we learn about interacting with others and about social and cultural values. Our students are part of a wider community and they need to understand how their actions and behaviours can impact others.

However, just like in the classroom we understand that it is normal for teenagers to make mistakes, in fact this is how they learn about social norms and societal expectations. But if they are not held to account for their actions, if they are not provided with a roadblock to reflect on their behaviours then they will not learn from them and as a school we will do them a complete disservice.

Once we can understand the concept of personal responsibility we can extend this to collective responsibility. There is an old saying "what you walk past, you accept". In our school we take collective responsibility for the way in which we operate, and ensure we do not become complacent about poor behaviour. Generally the behaviour of our students is absolutely outstanding, however, on occasions they forget about owning or taking personal responsibility for their actions.

Personal and collective responsibility in schools is critical in making sure the school is a positive and safe place for all students and a place in which learning is at the forefront. What is at stake are the fundamental principles of social justice and the character of our school.

We look forward to your continued support in getting our students to school, to staying engaged with their learning and to demonstrate and live our school values of respect, resilience and responsibility.

## **Health Programmes 2023**

For health education within the New Zealand Curriculum it is expected that schools will consult with their communities when developing health and sexuality education programmes at least once every two years.

The New Zealand Curriculum states that the focus of health is on the well-being of the students themselves, of other people, and of society through learning in health-related contexts. Four concepts are at the heart of this learning area: Hauora/Wellbeing, Attitudes and Values, Socio-ecological Perspective and Health Promotion. Within health and physical education, we are also expected to cover the seven key areas of learning. These are mental health, sexuality education, food and nutrition, body care and physical safety, physical activity, sport studies, outdoor education.

This year the health topics to be taught alongside the PE curriculum in school include:

#### Year 7:

 $\underline{\text{Term 1:}}$  Ko Wai Au – To gain understanding of their personal qualities, their values and what makes them unique.

<u>Term 2:</u> Positive Classrooms –Investigate the qualities of friendships and how to maintain friends.

Attitude (Outside Presenter) - Tackling Tech

<u>Term 3:</u> Personal Hygiene – Identifying adjustment strategies for changing bodies and health care agencies that may help.

<u>Term 4:</u> Dreaming of a Future – Exploring their interests and achievements and how these may affect their lifestyle.

#### Year 8:

<u>Term 1:</u> Communication – Exploring a range of communication methods and how to behave assertively in a variety of situations.

<u>Term 2:</u> Forever friends - Identifying features of a healthy friendship, how these affect feelings of self worth

Attitude (Outside Presenter) - Tackling Tech

<u>Term 3:</u> Smoking/Vaping – Are innovations always a good thing? Who, what and why are we influenced, exploring how smoking/vaping can contribute to common health problems and the effects on wellbeing.

My Body and Puberty – Identifying different aspects that affect males and females during puberty and who may help us cope with these changes; gaining a better understanding of the parts of the body.

<u>Term 4:</u> Discovering my future - Identifying personal qualities, learning pathways and career options available.

#### Year 9:

<u>Term 1:</u> Hauora - Exploring an adolescent's total wellbeing.

<u>Term 2:</u> Bullying – Identifying types of bullying, characteristics of a bully, asking for help, dealing with bullying as a bystander, and strategies to manage bullying.

Attitude (Outside Presenter) - Hardwired

<u>Term 3:</u> Goal Setting – Identifying how to set 'smart' goals and the different factors that could affect these goals for an adolescent.

<u>Term 4:</u> Alcohol (safe choices) – Demonstrating safe choices and taking positive action in relation to alcohol, the effects on the body and our wellbeing and the laws in New Zealand associated with alcohol. Once this unit is completed students will investigate other substances and their effects to ensure consequences are known.

#### Year 10:

<u>Term 1:</u> Hauora, Creating a vision board to represent who we are, long term goals for education, career and where we want to be in the future.

<u>Term 2:</u> Learning and Career Pathways, Including putting together a curriculum vitae.

Term 3: Whanaungatanga/Friendship, Exploring

friendship and how to achieve positive outcomes; building trust with interpersonal relationships. The importance of having a positive wellbeing and where to go for support if needed.

Attitude (Outside Presenter) Term 2 - Hardwired

<u>Term 4:</u> Contraception and STI's (Sexually Transmitted Infections), Increasing knowledge of the anatomy, merits of contraception, types of contraception and being aware of the signs and symptoms of STI's.

Seniors: Attitude Presentation Term 2 - Pits

## Curriculum English

This year, the school is making a big effort to help students become more confident with the essential basics of the



English language. Due to the rise of social media and textbased communication, our young people are becoming increasingly unaware of the 'correct' rules of language, particularly in written communications. As a result, with the mandating of a more rigorous literacy testing system, many students are discovering that they lack the expected level of language proficiency needed to be successful in their studies. To address this, we have increased the number of English periods per week for Years 9 and 10 students and are focusing on incremental reading and writing skills. The goal is to ensure that all students are well-prepared and confident in their ability to succeed in these tests in the future. The first round of testing will take place in mid-June, and the results are expected to be released in August. For this test we have enrolled all students in Year 10 and Year 11 to provide them with an opportunity to assess their current progress. The test will be available to students twice a year up to Year 13, allowing them ample time to develop the necessary skills. Additionally, the English department is preparing for the transition to the new Year 11 NCEA program in 2024. The Year 10 curriculum has already been adjusted to emphasize language and its relationship with context and social identity.

On a different note, in the English department, we are also closely following the rapid adoption of AI across various industries and institutions. Students are well aware of its capabilities, ranging from solving mathematical problems to generating fully written essays and research assignments. However, like any new tool, we aim to teach students proper and appropriate usage. Critical thinking, creativity, and emotional intelligence have always been integral parts of a quality English education, and these skills are especially essential in our present day. We believe there are many advantages to supporting students in developing a healthy engagement with emerging technologies as they continue to evolve.



We would like to thank Miss McMillan and Mr. Townsend for taking us there. Overall it was a great experience and I recommend you check it out sometime.



**School Newsletter** - Please let the school office know if you wish to receive a hard copy. The newsletter is also available to view on our school website and can be picked up at the school office.

Ka Ora, Ka Ako- The Healthy School Lunches programme is underway again in providing healthy lunches every day to all our students. Students have this meal at the start of Break 1- 10.45am and any leftover lunches is available to them at the start of Break 2.

Visitors to School - If you need to contact your child throughout the day, send a message or drop something off, then we ask you to contact or visit the office. All schools are governed by Health & Safety regulations and the expectation that all students, employees and visitors are safe while on the school grounds. We take our responsibility to keep your child safe seriously, and therefore all visitors need to report to and sign in at the office. In the event of an emergency we also need to ensure we know who is on the grounds and where. We thank you for your understanding in this matter.

Students bringing a Vehicle to School - Students may drive to school and park in the gym car park, provided they have either a Restricted or Full license. Before bringing a car to school students must provide a copy of their license and complete a permission slip signed by their parent/caregiver. It is at the discretion of the Senior Leadership Team whether students have permission to have a vehicle at school. Students are required to hand their keys in to the office on arrival and must travel alone unless they are permitted to carry passengers.

Naming Gear - A lot of uniform and non-uniform items are handed in to the office, some of which is very expensive. Please ensure all items brought or worn to school is named so lost items can be returned to the rightful owner.

#### RTLB

In the next few weeks the RTLB (Resource Teacher of Learning and Behaviour - Eric Hansen) will be assessing students who may be eligible for Special Assessment Conditions, called SAC.

This means students are able to have either a reader, writer, computer use, a separate space to sit the external exam and, in some cases, extended time.

You will be notified by Fiona Togia (SENCo, Learning Support) if your young person qualifies and what support they will receive. This process can take a few months.

## **NCEA FROM 2024**

Dear Parents/Caregivers

As part of the NCEA Change package, from 2024 learners will need to attain the new corequisite standards that will directly assess the foundational Te Reo Matatini me te Pāngaru - Literacy and Numeracy.



These standards will be externally assessed and students will need to pass them in order to be awarded any level of the NCEA qualification.

To achieve the NCEA corequisite, learners need to achieve the package of Te Reo Matatini me to Pāngaru - Literacy and Numeracy standards that are worth 20 credits in total.

This package consists of three exams:

Reading - read written text to understand ideas and information Writing - Write texts to communicate ideas and information Numeracy - Use mathematics and statistics to meet the numeracy demands of a range of situations.

Many learners may achieve the NCEA Literacy and Numeracy corequisite in Years 9 & 10 however, others may achieve this in Year 11 or beyond.

This year we have entered all our Year 10 and 11 students and selected Year 9 students into these Common Assessment Activities (CAA's). The first assessments will be held the week of the 12th to 16th June 2023 with a second opportunity in term 4 the week of 30th October 2023.

As a school, we will take every opportunity to prepare your child for these exams, including completing some practice exams online. The exams are digital, so it's important the students take responsibility and have a fully charged device with them both every day at school and during the examination period. Each exam will be held in the hall and is expected to take around  $1\frac{1}{2}$  hours, however there is currently no time limit for these exams. All exams are required to be completed within the one week time frame.
