Our students can be proud of their achievements this term - be it coming to school, getting involved in winter sport or school groups and most especially what they have achieved in their learning in spite of the many challenges that arose such as severe weather events, illness, road closures, strike action and rostering home to name a few. Thank you whanau for your continued support of our students, the staff and the school - Kāhore taku toa I te toa takitahi, he toa takitini" (We cannot succeed without the support of those around us)

The emergence of Chat GPT and Open AI has been on the horizon for a while now and presents a challenge in terms of how we look to educate and assess our students i.e. in how we deal with a global chatbot that uses artificial intelligence to write assignments.

For us as a school it will be how do we ensure our students are developing the skills of original thinking and ensuring that the manner in which we assess our students ensures authenticity. A particular challenge will be how to detect plagiarism as the work is original, but from AI.

What is also concerning is that these programmes can come up with any argument, irrespective of whether it is factual or not. The potential for misinformation is unprecedented and it could be a hard task for students to decipher fiction from non-fiction.

Therefore, the challenge for educators will be thinking about how we can utilise AI to enhance our teaching and learning programmes. The reality is that we have entered a new era of AI, and we need to think about how these programmes will empower our students.


Gateway at Ruawai College


Contact Information - Please remember to keep all information up to date. Eg emails, address, contact numbers, emergency contact.

Flash Fiction Day 2023

Flash fiction is a genre of writing where writers create stories under three hundred words. This might seem simple but crafting the emotional beats, character development and plot of a good story is a challenge when the word count is so limited.

This year was the 11th National Flash Fiction day for New Zealand. This style of writing is celebrated on the 22nd of June-the shortest day of the year. A youth competition open to writers from all around the world is run every year in conjunction with this event.

This year two of my stories, 'Ghosts are Perpetual Motion Machines, Therefore Physchists can't Believe in them' and 'Aim: To Find out if it is Possible to Reach a Velocity at Which the Gravitational Influence of a Smalltown can be Escaped From' made the shortlist of 15 stories from hundreds of entries. Alongside other shortlisted writers from as far afield as Japan and America, I read my short stories on the Flash Frontier youtube channel on the 10th of June as part of the lead up to National Flash Fiction day.

On National Flash Fiction day I was invited by the Whangarei 3.30 Flash Fiction Writers group to read my stories alongside other Northland writers who had made short and long lists for the adult competition. One of my stories, 'Aim: To find out if it is Possible to Reach a Velocity at Which the Gravitational Influence of a Smalltown Can be Escaped from,' was awarded commended (5th) in the international youth competition. I was also awarded the northland branch award for a youth writer.

Being able to represent Ruawai College and Northland internationally for writing was a privilege. My stories will both be published, along with judges' comments, at the end of June in a special edition of the online literary youth journal, Finger Comma Toes.




