## **Treaty of Waitangi**

Our Year 13 history class recently travelled North for a trip to the Waitangi Treaty Grounds, a journey that has deepened our understanding of New Zealand's foundational history. The trip offered a busy educational experience into the significant events and narratives that shaped the nation. Our class was lucky to have an exceptional educator from Waitangi treaty grounds named Karen. Karen's extensive knowledge and engaging storytelling, that she staggered to partner with the relevant sections within the museum, provided us with a thorough visual and verbal walkthrough of New Zealand's history, specifically focusing on the Treaty of Waitangi.

Her explanations were informative and will be very helpful for the upcoming history assessments. Her detailed korero about the Treaty's causes, the involved parties, and the far-reaching consequences of its signing showed the complexities of this historical event. Karen guided us through various exhibits that showcased artefacts and documents from the period. The museum's collection offered a tangible connection to the past, allowing us to see firsthand the items that played a role in the events we've studied. From the signing pens to original copies of the treaty, each artifact added depth to our understanding. Karen's korero was particularly helpful and informative as she explained the socio-political landscape of the time, giving us a clearer picture of the motivations and implications behind the treaty.

In addition to the museum tour, we had the privilege of witnessing a cultural performance including a welcome, oratory, waiata, haka, poi dance and te rakau. The performance was a vibrant display of music, dance, and storytelling, and a beautiful complement to the historical knowledge we gained. We also visited Hobson's House. Karen shared stories about Hobson's family and interests, the late night Treaty writing, and also about the purchase of the house whenua and its upkeep through a trust.

The trip also included a visit to an exhibition of modern Maori art. This section of our tour showcased the fusion of old and new in the artwork demonstrating how contemporary Maori artists are engaging with and reinterpreting traditional themes and motifs. We also spent time looking at pou, carved by different tribes and the Waka Ngātokimatawhaorua. Karen shared stories about the construction and purpose of building Ngātokimatawhaorua and also discussed the symbolism and narratives shown in a range of carvings.

### **Goat Island**

Our Year 12 class recently enjoyed an educational trip to Goal Island, where we had a unique opportunity to explore the rich marine environment and understand the critical efforts behind marine conservation.

The day's activities started with a visit to the Marine Discovery Center, where we engaged with interactive exhibits and were given a presentation on the philosophies, values, perspectives, and behaviors that marine conservationists adopt and lobby for to promote future-focussed sustainable fishing and protect marine ecosystems. The educators at the center explained how marine reserves like Goat Island serve as crucial sanctuaries for marine life, helping to preserve biodiversity and replenish fish stocks. We also learnt about how these reserves continue to benefit recreational and commercial fishing by providing a space for fish to reproduce safely.

The main message from the day was the emphasis or sustainability. We were introduced to the importance of ecotourism in supporting conservation efforts. We also had an opportunity to go on the glass-bottom boat and see the marine life and kelp that we had learnt about at the speaker presentations. The idea that tourism can be both enjoyable and beneficial to the environment was another perspective that was useful for our assignment.

The trip to Goat Island was not only educational but also a lot of fun.

On Tuesday 9th of April, I represented Ruawai College in Kaikohe at the Northland Secondary Schools combined training, where I completed a dressage test and then a round of showjumping. The team I was in, Ruawai/Dargaville/Otamatea, was sitting 6th out of 16 teams after dressage but ended up in 9th after show jumping.

On Friday 17th of May, I headed down to Taupō to compete in the North Island Secondary Schools Horse Trials. Over the weekend we competed in dressage, show jumping and cross country. After the dressage I was sitting in 7th out of 65 riders in the 80cm and then a clear show jumping moved me up into 5th. On Sunday we had our Cross country and ended in an unfortunate elimination. My team, which was made up of Ruawai, Orewa and Northcote, ended up 11th out of 26 teams. Although the weekend ended unfortunately, the experience itself made it worth it.

## **Project Pest Control**

Northland Region Council and Enviroschools where students learn about the control of various pests including possums Over the first two days the students went to Lake Waikere and Kai Iwi Lakes and learnt how to skin, hand pluck and machine pluck possums along with setting a trap line which was checked the next day. Our school trapped two possums that they then had to deal with. Six Year 11 students attended this course to support their Social Studies learning about Taking Action and Digital Technology learning where they will use their design skills to create pest control logos and information packs. The students are now setting their own traps at school and keeping a log book of their results before returning to Kai Iwi Lakes for their final assessment at the end of the term.






